School Goals

Through collaboration and innovative strategies that inspire students to make real world connections, we will accomplish the following goals:

- Provide an opportunity for all students in K - 5 to experience Project Lead the Way (PLTW) through Project Launch (a challenging STEM program) and through project-based learning instruction.
- Implement Guided Reading, Guided Math, and The Writing Academy in all grades K-5 to provide timely interventions and in-school tutoring.
- Provide differentiated instruction and interventions so that Pre-K through 2 grade students will reach Tier I in reading as measured by Istation for the next grade level and grades 3-5 will achieve a minimum of 80% in the Reading, Math, Language Arts, and Science STAAR state tests.
- Kinder through second grade students will acquire the recommended fluency rate as indicated by the district
 - Kindergarten 30 45 wpm
 - 1st Grade 60 90 wpm
 - 2nd Grade 70 130 wpm
 - 3rd Grade 80 140 wpm
 - 4th Grade 90 140 wpm
 - 5th Grade 100 150 wpm
- Enhance digital learning environment to promote 21st Century Skills.

Teachers, Parents, and Students together towards Success!

In the Classroom

- Utilize one-one and/or small group instruction during guided math and guided reading in the classroom to meet specific needs of the students.
- Utilize independent learning stations, web-based programs, modules, and project-based activities to develop real-world skills.
- Monitor fluency, comprehension, vocabulary development, and reading stamina through monthly running records, proficiency scales, data binders, and data walls.

Students

- Read 15 to 30 min daily at home and in the classroom to increase reading stamina.
- Use the design process to complete PLTW modules and project-based learning instruction in PreK - 5th grade through an enhanced digital learning environment.
- Participate in guided reading, such as F.I.T. (Falcon Intervention Time) and guided math and in-school tutoring to master the concepts covered during class instruction thereby closing any academic gaps.
- Participate in extended day and/or week instruction, as needed, to meet individual academic needs in grades K-5.
- 21st Century grant opportunities for additional tutoring and extra curricular activities.

At Home

- Families will stay informed about and support the academic initiatives for the 2023 - 2024 school year.
- Monitor and/or read 15 min (PreK-2) to 30 min (3rd - 5th grade) daily to develop fluency, comprehension, and stamina.
- Monitor child's progress in school by reviewing the See Saw, Remind, and Class Dojo communication to be informed of all academies students are acquiring.
- Participate in school activities such as Parent Meetings and parent University Workshops that focus on reading, math, and/or science to understand the concepts that students are learning at school.
